

Roadmap To A Registered Herd

A Dive Into Breeding Up With South Poll Genetics.

For a lot of commercial operations, switching to South Poll cattle sounds like an all-or-nothing proposition: sell out, take the check, and buy back in at registered prices. It doesn't have to work that way. **Breeding Up** is simply the process of taking the cows you already own and steadily moving them toward registered South Poll genetics, one calf crop at a time.

But How Do We Get There?

You start with your commercial base, breed to a registered Fullblood or Purebred South Poll bull, keep the best of what those matings give you, and do it again. Each generation carries a little more South Poll in it until you're running a herd that qualifies as Purebred for the registry, without ever having to liquidate the cattle that are already paying your bills.



The reason it's worth doing comes down to what these cattle are built for. South Polls were developed with the grass-based producer in mind; moderate-framed, heat-tolerant, fertile cows that hold their condition and breed back efficiently. Cross a quality South Poll bull onto your commercial cows and you'll see it in the very first calf crop: calmer cattle, improved heat tolerance, and replacements that do more on less grass. You're not waiting a decade for a payoff, the improvements show up right away.

If there's one decision that makes or breaks this plan, it's the bull. A bull will have the largest impact on your herd, which makes him the fastest way to change your genetics. A good bull can reshape your herd now and for the future. So as a goal you should buy the best registered South Poll bull you can afford, with a lineage or track record that will give you confidence in his abilities.





From there, the work turns to disciplined selection. Breed your whole herd to that bull, register every eligible, quality calf, and then be honest with yourself about what you keep. Hold back your best heifers and cull hard for the traits that pay on grass:

Fertility, udder quality, disposition, and forage efficiency. After two or three years, bring in a second, unrelated registered bull to keep your genetics fresh as your own daughters start entering the herd.

Played out over time, the path is pretty predictable. In Year 1 you buy your quality bull and breed the entire herd to that South Poll bull. By Year 3 you’re keeping only your best F1 daughters and adding that second bull. Around Years 4 and 5, a large share of your replacements are South Poll-influenced and you likely have a nucleus of registered cattle. By Years 8 to 10, nearly every cow in the pasture carries heavy South Poll genetic influence and you also likely have a purebred registered herd established, one that grew out of your commercial cows rather than replacing them.

A good commercial herd isn’t an obstacle to a registered South Poll operation, it can be the vehicle that gets you there. Done right, breeding up builds a commercially productive herd first and a marketable registered program second, so you’re selling profitable calves the whole way through instead of waiting on the genetics to catch up. Start with the right bull, keep your best, cull without apology, and let time and good selection do the rest.
